The Communicative Disorders Assistant Association of Canada (CDAAC) is a national organization for Communicative Disorders Assistants (CDAs).

Full membership in CDAAC requires successful completion of a CDAAC-recognized CDA program. Members are expected to adhere to the Code of Ethics of the Association.

CDAAC represents, supports, and promotes CDAs across the country.

CDAAC members participate in chapter meetings, conferences and annual general meetings for support, up-to-date information, and networking opportunities.

CDAAC affiliate memberships are also available for educational institutions and the public.

CDAs work in conjunction with Speech-Language Pathologists (SLPs) and Audiologists (AUDs) who provide clinical supervision.

Members of CDAAC have completed a recognized post-graduate CDA program and adhere to the Code of Ethics of CDAAC. CDAs also work within the guidelines for supportive personnel as set out by the governing body of the SLPs and AUDs with whom they work.

CDAs are trained to implement intervention as set out by SLPs and AUDs, who establish program goals.

CDAs are trained in a wide variety of areas including augmentative and alternative communication, articulation, phonology, language, voice, fluency, aural rehabilitation and audiology.

CDAs work with adults and children in a variety of settings including school boards, hospitals, treatment centres, long-term care facilities, community health units, private agencies and audiology clinics.
